A Day of Festive Fun! / Reminder about the Importance of Following the Directions of our Safety Patrol Team

Dear Rockwell Families,

Happy Friday from the ranch! It was a fun and festive day here at the Rock, complete with parties and creative costumes. A big thank you to all of our room parents who worked behind-the-scenes to support teachers and classrooms – we appreciate you, and the result will be memories our students will take with them well beyond their elementary years!

I'd also like to say a big thank you to Mrs. Willie in Third grade for her work putting together a video montage of our students and classes in lieu of a Halloween parade this year. Please keep an eye on next week's School Newsletter for a link to that video, and in the meantime, you'll find a few photographs from today in the "Snapshots of Rockwell Learning" section below.

Additionally, I'd like to share some reminders about our student Safety Patrol and ask for your help. Along with being an important component of keeping our students safe during arrival and dismissal, our student Safety Patrol is an important leadership experience for our fifth grade students (and Fourth graders later in the school year). Our Patrol students have received careful training and have strict guidance pertaining to when it is safe to allow students and families to cross. It has come to my attention that our students are being pressured to let groups cross from the front of the school to the pick-up area before it is the appropriate time. Additionally, there are some families who are using the ADA accessible ramp to cross to the parking lot instead of the main crosswalk - this is an area between the busses with very limited visibility. I'm asking that families use the main sidewalk to cross to the parking lot and wait until our students open the area. Also, I'd like to remind our families that we need to wait until the mailbox to let students into vehicles in the pick-up lane - boarding students earlier than that point slows down the pick-up line and is unsafe due to the numbers of cars entering and leaving the parking lot. I provided a reminder to all our students about these important points during morning announcements yesterday, and our teachers spoke with their classes as well. If you could also provide these reminders at home, it would be greatly appreciated. Thank you, and please let me know if you have any questions.

### Week 1 (Nov 5)

### November Character Trait of the Month: Gratitude

Gratitude is defined as "choosing to notice and appreciate things in our life, things in others, and things in the world." Gratitude is a choice we get to make over and over again. It is about choosing what we focus on, and it doesn't always have to be something positive. We can even feel grateful for the challenges in our life! There is plenty of research that shows a strong connection between Gratitude and reduced anxiety, increased happiness, and better relationships.

### Week 2 (Nov 12)

### November Character Trait of the Month: Gratitude

Start a conversation at home about what gratitude looks like and how it can be practiced at home and in the community.

- Talk about why you were grateful for the teachers and mentors in your life then ask your children why they are grateful for theirs. Have they had a favorite teacher? If so, who? What makes that teacher a favorite? If they haven't had a favorite yet, find out what makes a great teacher in their eyes.
- Gratitude takes practice! What can we do as a family to work on expressing Gratitude more regularly to each other and those around us?

• Discuss why you are grateful for your child. Be specific: who are they? How do they make you feel? Ask them what they are grateful for about your family, your home, your neighborhood, etc..

### Week 3 (Nov 19)

### November Character Trait of the Month: Gratitude

Find a place in your home to display a glass jar. Cut up small slips of paper and place them next to the jar. Use the jar to collect special people, places, events, and memories that your family is thankful for. Find a time each week to add slips of Gratitude to the jar. Having a gloomy day or a challenging time as a family? Pull out the slips of Gratitude and read them aloud as a family as a reminder of all of your grateful moments.

### November Character Trait of the Month: Gratitude

Pick one of the books below to read out loud together as a family. What can we learn from this book? How does the story reflect the virtue of gratitude?

### Highly Capable Universal Screening Update for 1st Grade

In order to decrease the number of assessments students are given, LWSD first grade students in LWSD will be universally screened using FastBridge for reading and math. Students that meet the screening criteria (85th percentile NPR

in each area) will be invited to continue in the highly capable eligibility process. The CoGAT screener will not be administered during the 2021-22 school year.

### Too Sick for School

One of the best ways to avoid community transmission of COVID-19, and other infectious illness, is to stay home when you are sick. Students and school employees who have symptoms of infectious illness, such as influeza (flu) or COVID-19 should stay home and seek medical evaluation, which may include testing for COVID-19 and other respiratory infections.

While the school will no longer require an attestation form at the start of each day, we ask families to please answer the following questions at home before deciding to send your child to school. If you answer "YES" to any of the following questions, keep your student home and contact your school.

- 1. Has your student been in close contact with anyone with confirmed COVID-19?
- 2. Does anyone in your household have COVID-19 like symptoms and/or is anyone in your household being tested for COVID-19?
- 3. Has your student or anyone in your household had a positive COVID-19 test for active virus in the past 10 days?
- 4. Within the past 14 days, has a public health or medical professional told your student to self-monitor, self-isolate or self-quarantine because of concerns about COVID-19?



### Equity Update – Stereotype Threat

Hello from the Rockwell Equity team!

Today we will talk about stereotype threat – what is it and what impact does it have?

### Stereotype threat, what is it?

• Stereotype threat refers to the risk of confirming negative stereotypes about an individual's racial, ethnic, gender, or cultural group

### What impact does this have?

- People may experience stereotype threat many times a day because we have multiple identities – stereotypes stemming from race, age, gender etc.
- Stereotype threat can affect an individual's life, ambitions performance or confidence in their own abilities

### What is an example of this?

- The **model minority** myth is a practical example of this. This is commonly a stereotype of an ethnic, racial, or religious minority group that is assumed to have achieved a high level of educational, economical, and professional success. One common reference to this is with Asian Americans and having a high aptitude in math or other academics.
- You might ask what is wrong with this? This myth ignores the diversity amongst individuals and various Asian cultures as well as the history behind where this started and how it was used to highlight the value of assimilation.
- Consider how this myth might impact the way a child might be held to a higher standard in a classroom or alternately not receive extra help if they are struggling. How might this impact a child's perception of self-worth?

Survey

Dear Families,

As you may already be aware, growing our students' social-emotional ("SEL") skills is an important goal for our school. As part of these activities, we survey students (grades 3-12) and ask them to reflect on their own mindsets and approaches to learning. The data we get back helps us continue to identify opportunities for growth and development with our students.

We partner with a leader in the SEL space, Panorama Education. Panorama develops tools to empower schools and districts to learn about students' self-perceptions, better understand student experiences in their learning environment, and identify opportunities to enhance support of teachers and counselors as they implement SEL programs.

Panorama's SEL survey is grouped into three categories:

- Student competencies
- Student supports and environment
- Teacher skills and perspectives

These surveys will help shape the districts' approach to supporting teachers' work in service of the whole student.
